Message from the Chair of the Governing Body

It is with great pleasure that I bring you this Governor's Report to Parents following a year that has been both challenging and very successful.

The principal challenge was the amalgamation of the four schools which are now contained within the Ebbw Fawr Learning Community. Those schools were Ebbw Vale Comprehensive School, Glyncoed Comprehensive School, Waunllwyd Primary School and Pontygof Primary School.

It should be remembered that the buildings which provide the primary phase and the secondary phase were not completed on time. There were delays in the delivery of both of the buildings which meant disruption to staff and pupils. I am very pleased to say that although there were a number of challenges and problems associated with that seismic change, both buildings are up and running with state of the art facilities and resources. The Governing Body would like to place on record their gratitude and admiration for the way in which staff and pupils coped in a very trying period.

The intake of Year 7, September 2012 was 212 and 51 students joined us in Year 12 entering the Sixth Form. Examination results were very good, with 44% of Year 11 students obtaining 5 or more Level 2 qualifications (equivalent to GSCE A* to C) with many students achieving A and A* grades. The most recent Key Stage 3 and Key Stage 4 data from the Welsh Government is included in this report in Appendices A and B. Please note that Key Stage 4 information is provisional only.

I would like to congratulate all students on their achievements and continued success.

Without doubt our popularity and success stems from the commitment of all our teaching staff, support staff and governors. As governors we are very grateful for the continuing hard work and commitment of the Director and all the staff of the Ebbw Fawr Learning Community. There is an excellent relationship between students and staff which does not go unnoticed by visitor to the school.

As Chair of the Governing Body, I would yet again like to express my sincere gratitude to my fellow governors who voluntarily give many hours of their time freely to outside meetings, recruiting staff and ensure it complies with the ever increasing statutory legislation. Their support for the school is greatly appreciated.

Again, this year's sporting achievements have been notable and further details of our students' success can be found later in this report. The music and drama events have been of a very high standard and students have achieved success in a wide variety of contexts.

Finally parental support is of vital importance for the success of the school and we take this opportunity to express our appreciation for your continued support.

Financial Statement 2012/13

The Resources and Personnel committee met regularly throughout the year to establish and monitor the substantial school budget. Bringing the four former school budgets together as one proved to be a complicated task and I am grateful to the Director and his Finance team for their endeavours throughout the year. We now have one dedicated 3-16 budget. Whilst the school's budget is relatively healthy this financial year, we are facing challenges ahead including;

- 1. Falling birth rates in the secondary phase which will see numbers (and income) fall for the next few years
 - 2. Under capacity in the primary phase.
- 3. The necessity of a substantial fund to be allocated towards replacing the IT equipment. Whilst we are fortunate to have everything new, this does mean that much of our equipment will need to be replaced at roughly at the same time.

In terms of staffing we remain fully staffed in all areas of the school. During the last financial year we undertook a review of staffing and a small number of staff left under the Council's voluntary redundancy terms and conditions. A small number of staff carry management responsibility allowances under protection following the closure of the former schools. This protection ends in September 2015 when a new staffing structure will be introduced. Governors will work closely with the Director and all staff to ensure this new structure is planned and directed for the benefit of the students.

I am grateful to Governor members of the Resources and Personnel Committee for their commitment during the year.

Marie to add comment

The end of year Surplus figure for 2012/2013 looks extremely healthy but this total includes amounts that are due to be spent in the financial year 2013/2014.

Departments retained some of their Capitation so that new resources could be purchased when the secondary phase moved to the new build. During this current school year Departments will be able to purchase resources that will work with the new technology that is now available in departments.

Energy costs and billing procedures meant that not all bills relating to the financial year 2012/2013 had been received by 1st April. Therefore the budget allocated to these costs was 'rolled over' to the next financial year to cover these costs.

Also, extra staffing and intervention classes were established to support students with literacy and numeracy skills and through grant funding we were able to recover some of this expenditure.

CURRICULUM & EDUCATIONAL PROVISION

Curriculum Structure

We aim to offer a range of experiences that will provide innovative and transformational opportunities for learning. The curriculum will develop students as independent, interdependent and confident learners. All students are individuals and we are committed to ensuring that any and all barriers to learning are identified and removed, allowing every learner to reach their full potential. Every effort will be made

to ensure that no learner is left behind and equal emphasis will be placed on ensuring that all students including the more able, gifted and talented achieve to their full potential.

Foundation Phase

The Foundation Phase Curriculum consists of seven areas of learning and experiences.

The areas are:

- Personal and Social Development, Well-Being and Cultural Diversity.
- Language, Literacy and Communication Skills.
- Mathematical Development.
- Welsh Language Development
- Knowledge and Understanding of the World.
- Physical Development
- Creative Development

Key Stage 2

In Key Stage 2 the following subjects are taught in line with the 2008 National Curriculum;

English, Mathematics, Science, Welsh, Information and Communication Technology, Art and Design, Geography, History, Music, Physical Education and Design and Technology.

The children will participate in a programme of Personal, Social and Health Education which will promote health and wellbeing, including the personal, social, spiritual, moral and cultural development of pupils. The children will also study RE as a statutory requirement.

In Key Stage 3 a comprehensive range of subjects are delivered to pupils by subject teaching specialists. The collaboration with primary partner schools to ensure consistency in curriculum provision continues to be of a high standard. Basic Skills provision has been developed through such initiatives as corrective and paired reading, the numeracy scheme and spelling provision. A fulfilling curriculum is offered to vulnerable pupils through our SEAL, peer mentoring and counselling schemes, while more able and talented pupils have opportunities to gain additional accreditation.

The School is successful in ensuring that all pupils follow their preferred choice of study at Key Stage 4. The School offers a good range of general and vocational

courses including a range of classroom and offsite provision. The School meets the requirements of the Learning and Skills [Wales] Measure. We collaborate well with our partners in the local area to make sure that all learners' needs are met.

Learning Support Provision

In order to meet the needs of all our pupils/students, we will follow well defined procedures for the identification and assessment of children with additional needs. Parents are encouraged to speak to the form teacher/ tutor, Year Leader, Additional Learning Needs Co-ordinator (ALNCO) if they are concerned about their child's learning or behaviour. If a child's name is placed on the 'Special Educational Needs List', parents are informed of this. They are subsequently involved in regular discussions about their child's progress and about ways in which they can help at home. In the majority of cases, needs will be met by the subject teachers who will provide differentiated teaching within the classroom. In other cases, children are withdrawn on a regular basis to work with staff on a specific Intervention Programme for an agreed length of time.

Welsh is studied at both Key Stage 3 and at Key Stage 4. Pupils all study short course GCSE Welsh in KS 4 at either foundation or higher level as part of the extended core. Some pupils opt to take the full course qualification as part of their option choices, whilst those who are more able have studied the full GCSE Welsh course in their extended core lessons.

Action to promote healthy eating

Appetite for Life is the Welsh Government's plan for improving the food and drink provided in schools in Wales. It sets new food, drink and nutrient standards that mean food provided in school will be healthy and well balanced and snack foods and drinks with little or no nutritional value will not be available.

The food and drink based standards apply across the school day including breakfast clubs, mid-morning break and lunch time provision. The nutrient based standards apply to the food served at lunch times.

What are the "nutrient based standards"?

The nutrient based standards list a maximum amount of fat, saturated fat, added sugars and salt and minimum amount for vitamins and minerals for an average school lunch. There are also calorie limits which mean that the average school lunch contains energy which is right for the needs of children and young people.

All the food provided by Blaenau Gwent Catering Team at lunchtimes has been nutritionally analysed against the nutrient based standards to ensure your child can choose from a healthy balanced variety of foods at lunch time

In the secondary phase the range of food on offer tends to be wider and more varied than in the primary phase. The secondary phase offer a wide range of options such as traditional hot dishes and meal deals – offering good value for money, salad bars, and jacket potatoes with fillings, sandwiches, baguettes, rolls and healthy drinks.
