National Recognition for Ebbw Fawr



Education Minister Huw Lewis AM, has announced that Ebbw Fawr Learning Community has been chosen as one of the schools who will lead on the design and development of the new curriculum for Wales which is due to be available to schools by 2018.

In a double announcement the Minister also said that Ebbw Fawr has been asked to join the network of schools who are leading on the new arrangements for teachers professional development to ensure that all teachers in Wales get high quality, professional learning opportunities throughout their careers. The selected schools will work together as *pioneer schools* driving forward improvements in standards.

Mr Lewis said "All of our pioneer schools will have a crucial role in ensuring that our ambitious and exciting future for education in Wales is realised."



Ebbw Fawr Learning Community Director Graeme Harkness said after the announcement;

"I am delighted to say that Ebbw Fawr has been asked to become a New Deal Pioneer School and a New Curriculum Pioneer School. This is a tremendous accolade for the school, but particularly for the staff who have readily engaged to improve their practice over the last three years. We are now working through the implications of this and look forward to sharing the outstanding practice that exists here with other school across Wales."

During the launch conference in Cardiff, a member of staff at Ebbw Fawr, Rebecca Hodson was invited to speak after the Minister to provide a teachers view of the impact of the schools work and particularly the impact when professionals take responsibility for their own learning.

Students becoming young investors

Students at Ebbw Fawr Learning Community have invested just over £900 from a fund-raising day into businesses in Africa and Asia through the Lendwithcare scheme.

This is an innovative way to help people in developing countries



transform their own futures. Lendwithcare enabled the school to lend the money raised by each class directly to small business owners in developing countries to help them grow their businesses. Rather than receiving a oneoff donation, the entrepreneurs will pay the loan back to each class, using income from their growing business. Each class will then get to choose what to do with the money next.

Organiser, Mr C Walters said "Businesses invested in by our students will help to buy seed for farmers in a co-operative in Zimbabwe, put stock in a clothes shop in Cambodia and even helped buy fishing nets in Ecuador."

Director Graeme Harkness said "This initiative is designed to inspire a fascination and curiosity about the world; develop research and critical thinking skills; and equip our students with knowledge about personal finances, such as savings, debt and budgeting, and career choices such as business or enterprise. It is about connecting our classrooms to real people trying to better themselves, and their families, through hard work."

Year 7 Football

The Welsh cup is the foremost competition that the boys play in and the first round had to be played by the end of September. This is a difficult challenge as we were only getting to know the squad by then, but the boys who took part all did an exceptional job.

In what was their first competitive game for the school, the boys took a little while to get used to the large playing area and the full-size goals. At club level they play on a reduced sized pitch with three quarter size goals.

They went a goal down to Oakdale, then 2-1 down before taking command of the game. They eventually ran out 5-3 winners with goals from Kian Hiscocks, Jamie Barnes (2) and man of the match Harrison Baker (2).

Blackwood were a strong school outfit with many of their boys representing Caerphilly County schools team. Our lads put up a good fight for long periods but



finally succumbed to lose the game 6 -0. It is unfortunate to go out of the competition early but the experience will do the boys good and we hope to do better next year. After the disappointing defeat to Blackwood the squad reacted in the right manner with a win against West Mon School (Pontypool). We went a goal down early in the first half, but bounced back with a great team display, scoring three excellent goals. The pick being a superb strike from outside the box by man of the match, Jack Winterson. Once the boys were on level terms they outplayed their opponents and their dominance was rewarded by two further goals from Aaron Jones and Jamie Barnes (pen).

During the first half term, Year 3 and 4 studied the topic '999 Emergency'. Students learnt about the fire, police and ambulance services as well as the coastguards and the mountain rescue team. A highlight of the topic was a visit from a nurse, who showed us some of the equipment that she uses every day in her job. A particular favourite with the students was the space blanket. All children thoroughly enjoyed the visit and were especially keen to actively participate – both in modelling the uniform and being bandaged up!

Learning Resource Base Community Visit



Students from the Learning Resource Base have been participating in a number of visits in the local community. During October they visited the local Owl Sanctuary as part of their science curriculum as they have been studying 'Predators and Prey'. In November they were invited by Mr Nick Pepper,

Head of the local fire station, to visit the station to see how it operates. The students were dressed up in full kit and were thrilled to be able to use the hoses in a drill. We were accompanied by a group from Pen-Y-Cwm Special School as part of the outreach programme between the two schools. The visits aim to broaden the students' understanding of the local community as well as different jobs. Future visits include the Police Station and Bedwellty House and Park.





Forest School Activities



A new term saw the start of a new challenge - Forest School. This is a stimulating set of activities, that offers learners regular opportunities to achieve and develop confidence and self-

esteem through hands-on learning experiences in a

woodland or natural environment. Students initially gained experience of working at two local nature reserves; Beaufort Woodlands and Silent Valley, where many conservation activities have enabled them to work together and bond whilst developing their skills.

First up was to prepare a section at Beaufort Woodlands to create a "glade" or open space which would benefit fauna and flora. The management work will help an old hedgerow gain valuable light and prevent



thinning and further degradation. Future plans are to manage the hedge by means of layering. Tasks involved trimming and felling of willow and alder; nothing will be



wasted either, small branches will be shredded and used for covering the improved footpath they created, whilst larger branches will either be used for hedging stakes or stacked to create a hibernaculum (home and shelter for many native creatures). We were supported with the activities by Sally Morgan – Project Officer at Keep Wales Tidy.

A few weeks in and Chris Reed - Assistant Reserve

Officer at Gwent Wildlife Trust invited us to help remove a barbed wire fence and posts at the Silent Valley Nature Reserve. The reasoning behind the removal of the fence was to manage the growth of bracken, which has severely overgrown and is choking the glades. Roaming animals will then be able to naturally manage the bracken by foraging and eating.



Other projects have included the creation of a wooden viewing platform, path maintenance, fence maintenance and a survey on dog fouling. The viewing platform activity enabled the students to participate in developing their skills with tools, working together and importantly numeracy. "Measure twice, cut once" was the motto they learned repeatedly and thankfully no waste material was generated by mismeasuring! In rotation the students had the opportunity to complete some path maintenance adjacent to the platform, grass and weeds that had grown into the path were cleared and swept to restore the



path to its former glory. It has taken us a few sessions but teamwork and hard graft prevailed and the result is astonishing. The job is not quite complete but we will continue when the weather allows.



The last couple of weeks have been difficult due to extreme weather conditions, but we have endeavoured to support the community as best as possible. Sally from Keep Wales Tidy had asked us to help out with a "Dog Fouling" survey and Sally had the unfortunate job of

raising awareness activity. Sally had the unfortunate job of

removing the dog foul but the students enjoyed marking the areas with chalk spay and stencils, thus raising awareness of the issue. Approximately 30 bags were removed in the first week and an improved 10 bags in the second. Hopefully this trend will continue and we will eradicate this anti-social behaviour in the community.



Our current task is the creation of wild flower containers around the base of trees, something I saw previously in a



London borough that would enhance the look as well as supporting the Welsh Government pollinator project. There are 7 trees in total and 2 have been completed so far.

Carillion Visit

A group of more able and talented year 10 students visited the Carillion A465 (phase 3) project to find out more about careers in civil engineering. The project is part of an ongoing multi million pound initiative upgrading the existing highway to provide better links within Wales on behalf of Welsh Government.

15 students were invited onto the site as part of Ebbw Fawr's strong links with Carillion. The children, along with Mr Ager, visited aspects of the project, looking at what is involved with the development of a scheme that cost over \pounds 150 million to complete.

Back in the site office, the students supported by Martin Gallimore, the Carillion Sustainable Communities Manager, learnt all of the amazing facts associated with the new improvement scheme and met with graduates from both Carillion and ARUP, who spoke about all of the different careers on offer in civil engineering.
