## Uniform Policy Polisi Gwisg Ysgol

Our students take pride in their uniform and appearance and visitors always comment on how smart they look. Our agreed policy is as follows:

- Coats are stored in bags
- Hoodies are not allowed
- Only one pair of stud earrings should be worn (No facial piercings are allowed including transparent nose studs)
- Hair colour and style is natural and not extreme
- Tailored trousers to be worn (Leggings & Jeans are not allowed)
- Skirts of appropriate length
- Plain black shoes (not trainers or Dr Marten boots)

Where students have a cultural or religious issue regarding certain items of clothing, jewellery or other items, it should be placed in writing to the Headteacher with supporting evidence.

Please note that where students do not comply with our uniform expectations, action will be taken through our sanction process and this may include being sent home to change or amend any nonuniform or associated issues, or being provided with the correct uniform from our uniform bank.

## Attendance and Punctuality Presenoldeb a Phrydlondeb

Attendance at the Learning Community is a legal requirement and all parents/carers are responsible for ensuring that their children attend the Learning Community regularly and on time. Attendance is monitored carefully and interventions are put in place when the Learning Community's target is not being met.

Key points are:

- Tutors will monitor students' attendance weekly.
- Where progress is a concern, a team of staff including the Education Welfare Officer, the Head of Year, and Pastoral Managers will liaise with parents/carers.
- Parents/carers should contact the Learning Community daily about any absence.
- Holidays in term time are not authorised, however parents should continue to inform the school if they plan to take their child out of school during term time. Holidays will be recorded as "unauthorised absence".
- Medical appointments such as doctor/dentist visits should be made out of Learning Community time wherever possible.
- Where consultant/orthodontist appointments occur, students should only be absent for the appointment and not the whole day/session.
- Parents/carers will be contacted/invited in, to discuss any concerns regarding attendance and punctuality.
- Where progress continues to be a concern following intervention, more formal processes will be taken including:
  - \* Formal meeting with the Head of Year and Assistant Headteacher.
  - \* Learning Community Attendance Meeting with the Education Welfare Officer.
  - \* Fixed Penalty Notice issued.

Our Attendance Target for 2025/2026 is 92%

We expect all students to arrive on time to lessons. As with attendance, where issues occur, interventions and sanctions are put in place, which are communicated to parents.

We are able to track students every lesson and can register them at any time of the day via our electronic registration system.

Full attendance is essential, wherever possible, to ensure that your child makes good progress. Research shows that children will not meet or exceed targets if their attendance is poor.

Every child should aim to achieve 100% attendance but, unless there is an unavoidable problem, 92% is the minimum. 92% attendance means that your child will miss no more than  $1\frac{1}{2}$  days in any half term.

Through our online platform, ClassCharts, parents/carers can access daily updates on their child's attendance, which helps them stay informed and engaged with their child's school journey.





### Absence Absenoldeb

If your child is ill, please ring school (01495 354690) on the first day of absence and explain the problem and indicate a return date. If a member of staff does not answer the phone, please leave detail of absence on the voicemail.

Our staff will ring you if we don't know why your child is not in school. Please make sure that school has your current home and current mobile numbers. If we do not know why a student is absent, staff may visit your home to see what the reason for absence is. This is partly to make sure that you do not need any extra support.

#### Holidays Gwyliau

Parents should be aware that the Governing Body has adopted a policy which does not allow the Head of Secondary to authorise holidays in term time unless it can be shown that there are special or exceptional circumstances for requesting the leave of absence.

Please notify the school if you intend to take your child out of school for a holiday. This will always be recorded as an absence from school regardless of whether the absence is authorised or not.

#### Medical Welfare Lles meddygol

Ebbw Fawr has qualified first aid cover for emergencies and accidents. However, our first aid staff are not qualified nurses. We work closely with a part-time Specialist Community Public Health Nurse who works on specific medical issues with identified students.

Where there is any medical illness or condition, parents/ carers should consult their doctor as it is not our remit to diagnose or treat such conditions, other than following the stated medical advice from the practitioners involved.

It is important that parents/carers inform Student Services and the Tutor/Head of Year of any known medical conditions.





# Safeguarding Diogelu Plant

Child abuse is a particularly sensitive issue and often involves, particularly for parents/carers, strong feelings and emotions. However, the Learning Community has a duty, in line with local authority guidance to act on any situation where abuse is suspected.

All Learning Community staff must report any such concerns to the Headteacher or designated teachers for Child Protection. The Learning Community will then follow local authority guidance for seeking advice, reporting or referring any such cases. This may involve contact with: parents/carers; social care team; police child protection team and other relevant professionals.

Parents/carers can seek advice from the Education Welfare Officer at the Learning Community or from the appropriate outside agency.

The Learning Community has stringent safeguarding processes in place for the employment and control of other adults on the premises.

All visitors must report to reception on arrival.

## Complaints Cwynion

Ebbw Fawr is committed to dealing effectively with complaints. We aim to clarify any issues about which you are not sure. If possible we will put right any mistakes we have made and we will apologise. We aim to learn from mistakes and use that experience to improve what we do.

If you are approaching us for the first time you should give us an opportunity to respond. If you are not happy with our response then you may make your complaint using our agreed policy which is available on request. Most concerns can be settled quickly just by speaking to the relevant person in the organisation without the need to use a formal procedure.

We believe that all complainants have a right to be heard, understood and respected. A copy of our Complaints Policy is available on the school website.

We will take your concerns and complaints seriously and, where we have made mistakes, will try to learn from them.

If you need help to make your concerns known we will try and assist you. If you are a young person and need extra assistance, the Welsh Government has established MEIC which is a national advocacy and advice helpline for children and young people. ## Transport Trafnidiaeth

Transport arrangements are the responsibility of the local authority and they operate under the current policy shown below:

Under Welsh Government guidelines, councils have a statutory duty to provide free home to school transport for students who live more than three miles from their nearest suitable maintained secondary school. The guidance is that the distance should be measured using the shortest available safe walking route. However, Blaenau Gwent Council has a more generous policy than that set out in the Welsh Government guidelines. Blaenau Gwent Council provides free transport for secondary aged students who live more than two miles from their nearest suitable school. Therefore, the council assists with the provision of free transport for students who qualify under the policy.

## Cycles Beiciau

We have cycle racks available at school.

In the interest of both rider safety and the general public, we wish to emphasise the following:

It is the responsibility of parents/carers to ensure that a child's cycle is in safe roadworthy condition at all times. Parents/carers are strongly advised to ensure that their child wears appropriate and adequate protective clothing when cycling to and from Ebbw Fawr Learning Community (a British Standard approved helmet and reflective strips are recommended).

The Learning Community cannot accept responsibility for damage to or loss of cycles within the Learning Community grounds. All parents/carers are strongly advised to check they have appropriate insurance cover and provide a suitable security lock.

### Travelling to and from the Learning Community Yn teithio i ac o'r Gymuned Ddysgu

Students are always representative of Ebbw Fawr Learning community. This includes journeys to and from school and time spent in the community.

We request that students treat members of the general public with the respect and good humour that is expected every second of the Learning Community day. We expect the very best behaviour on buses and in the community and that no litter is dropped.

Remember that the reputation of the Learning Community can be harmed by thoughtless or silly behaviour that may cause harm to people and property. The Learning Community will take action if this is the case.





## **Refreshments** Lluniaeth

We operate a cashless catering system where food can be bought in the cafeteria using a 4 digit pin which is pre-paid. This will reduce queues at lunchtime and provide anonymous free meals to eligible students.

IpayImpact has been introduced to allow parents to pay online for school lunches, trips & visits. Individual login details will be provided to parents on admission.

Space is available for eating packed lunches. Food may not be consumed in classrooms or corridors or outside except in designated areas.

#### Break and Lunchtime Amser Cinio ac Egwyl

All students are expected to remain on the Learning Community premises, including lunchtimes unless special permission has been given.



## SPARX Reading Darllen ô SPARX

Encouraging daily reading at home helps children build essential literacy skills that benefit them for life. Sparx Reader supports this by offering ebooks tailored to each student's reading level. As they read, students answer questions to check comprehension and earn points to climb a leaderboard. Logging in is simple students go to **sparxreader.com** and sign in using the Microsoft button. Sparx Reader is accessible on any internet-connected device with a web browser, making it easy to use at home. With your support, reading can become a daily habit that nurtures a lifelong love of books and learning. Pupils will be expected to complete a minimum of 40 minutes of careful reading per week.

#### Electronic Devices Dyfeisiau Electronig

Ebbw Fawr Learning Community suggests that students do not bring valuable items such as ear-buds and mobile phones to the Learning Community. However, should your child bring a device or phone then this must be turned off in lessons and in bags at all times.

Students have access to a telephone at Student Services should they need to contact home during the Learning Community day in an emergency. Parents needing to contact students in an emergency should do so via the Main Reception as opposed to contacting students on a mobile phone.

Ebbw Fawr Learning Community will not accept liability for any such item of equipment being lost or stolen on the school premises or during school trips.

Examination Boards will disqualify any student from all their examinations if they are found to have a mobile phone in their possession during an examination.

#### Chromebooks Gliniaduron

As part of our drive to enhance the digital competency of our learners all students are provided with their own Chromebook device during their five years at Ebbw Fawr for use in class and at home.

This ensures that learners can easily access curriculum resources and carry out research when completing homework as well as having access to classwork if they are absent.

Each Chromebook will be accompanied by a charger and a durable case to protect the device. The learners are expected to charge the devices at home so do not need to bring the chargers to school. We understand that electricity prices have increased significantly recently but please be assured that the cost of charging a Chromebook amount to 3p/day.

To cover damage to equipment, we request a £5 payment to provide insurance for the device.



## Curriculum Structure Strwythur y Cwricwlwm

We aim to offer a range of experiences that will provide innovative and transformational opportunities for learning. The curriculum will develop students as independent, interdependent and confident learners.

All students are individuals and we are committed to ensuring that any and all barriers to learning are identified and removed, allowing every learner to reach their full potential.

Every effort will be made to ensure that no learner is left behind and equal emphasis will be placed on ensuring that all students including the more able, gifted and talented achieve to their full potential.

Our curriculum model will be based around both academic rigour and real life work based learning. The learning journey of each individual will be carefully constructed to suit the individual's preferred learning style and will involve the learner in planning that programme.

Students will be grouped in a variety of ways in order to best meet their individual needs. These will include: setting, banding and on occasions being taught as a form. We will pay particular attention to ensuring that children are taught appropriately for their ability and cater for their various needs by providing a range of different teaching approaches.

Our school Senedd prides itself on being inclusive, with representatives from all year groups and all equality groups. This allows an opportunity to reach out to the whole school to capture the wide views of learners for everyone to have their voice heard.

The Senedd Cabinet provides leadership and development opportunities to our students and the responsibility to make decisions which impacts on them.

The Senedd will play an integral role in our new Table Talk Tuesday where pupils can voice concerns and idea around a chosen theme. We value pupil voice at Ebbw Fawr and have made it our mission to ensure that we show we're listening by introducing our You Said, We Did initiative.

The Senedd Cabinet meets on a frequent basis to discuss current topics and issues and are always on hand to chat to students and list their opinions. If you would like to get involved, elections for Year 7 will begin in October.



# Wellbeing Lles

At Ebbw Fawr, we strive to ensure wellbeing is at the heart of our community. Having the wellbeing as a core value of our school not only improves morale and performance, but normalises conversations about health, whether physical or mental, enabling people to speak out sooner if they are struggling or worried about someone else. We recognise that, in the same way we all have fluctuating physical health needs, we all have mental health needs too.

Within Ebbw Fawr Learning Community there are a wide range of wellbeing support services available to students, which run alongside the traditional pastoral system, typical examples are SEAL (Social & Emotional Aspects of Learning), SAP (Student Assist Programme), LGBTQ+ groups, young carers, Inspire2achieve, bereavement support and the school counsellor. Access to such services is usually based upon pupil need which, in turn, influences the level and duration of support provided.

We wholeheartedly believe that a pupil's wellbeing is **just as important** as academic achievements. Mental health and wellbeing is undoubtedly linked to academic performance: **we don't neglect the first when pursuing the second.** 



Spot it, Sort it Is our new, discrete reporting tool for pupils experiencing, or witnessing concerns. Learners can use the app to report bullying, mental health, vandalism and harassment.

Typing can be easier than talking. Some pupils may find it easier to document concerns on an online form that to speak to an adult in person. All submissions to Spot it, Sort it are then followed up by staff during the school day, or if posted in the evening, the next available school day.

The tool is accessible in school and at home. QR codes are displayed across the school building, as well as on magnets given to pupils. There is also a link on the school intranet.





#### Assessment and Reporting Asesiadau ac Adroddiadau

Our school's curriculum is chosen to meet the needs of the pupils in the school.

Teachers routinely check that their curriculum is working and that all pupils are progressing.

Assessment is built into the school's curriculum and will be part of their everyday learning experience. Pupils will be working with their teachers to understand how well they're moving forward.

This is important to:

 help pupils see where they are in their learning and develop a clear understanding of what success looks like and how it can be achieved;

- help pupils plan their next learning steps;
- find ways to stretch or challenge pupils to learn more;
- spot any barriers to learning;

 help teachers see how well their class is progressing towards the curriculum;

• collaborate regularly with parents to share evidence of their children's progress and create engaging opportunities to further their learning at home.

The new curriculum is a journey which builds knowledge and skills over time. Assessment will be indistinguishable from teaching and learning and will be a part of every lesson. It will support individual pupils on an ongoing day to day basis as well as capture and reflect on a pupil's progression overtime.

There may be times when pupils will move forward quickly, other times progress will slow down and the teacher will need to make sure pupils understand a topic. Moving forward isn't always linked to their age. It won't happen in the same way and at the same time for everyone.

Pupils will move forward as their knowledge increases; their understanding of things gets deeper; their communication, physical and cognitive skills grow; their skills improve. They will show an increasing effectiveness as a learner, make connections across the curriculum with increasing independence.

Parents will receive information about their child's progression each term through either reports, assemblies and/or parents' evenings.

## The assessments for Numeracy (Procedural), Numeracy (Reasoning) and Reading

The purpose of these assessments is to find out children's strengths and areas for improvement so that their teachers can help them develop their skills.

Personalised assessments are taken on-line and are

adaptive, meaning that questions are selected based on the responses to previous questions. This provides a tailored assessment experience for each pupil and will help all

pupils develop their skills through understanding what they can do, the things they may need to work on, and their next steps. Pupils must complete the assessments once during the academic year.

After your child has completed a personalised assessment, their teacher can see feedback on their skills and progress which helps the teacher to plan the next steps for your child's learning.

#### **Rewards and Sanctions** Gwobrwyau a Chosbau

There is a clear system for rewarding students in their academic, sporting and extra-curricular activities. These achievements are also celebrated during assemblies and at our Achievement Evenings.

We believe in working very closely with parents and carers to ensure that all our learners achieve their true potential. To develop our home to school relationships further we will be using a monitoring system called 'Class Charts' at Ebbw Fawr.

#### Class Charts Siartiau Dosbarth

Class Charts is an App-based online application that enables students, parents, and staff to be involved in learning. The application allows students to view their timetable, any homework set and the supporting resources linked to it. This allows them to take ownership of their learning. Students can also see immediately, positive, and negative comments from a particular lesson.

Parents can also access the application to easily montor attendance, homework submission, celebrate achievement and monitor any negative behaviour points or detentions. The school will also use the system to send important messages directly to groups of students,

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### Additional Learning Needs Anghenion Dysgu Ychwanegol

In order to meet the needs of all our students, we follow well defined procedures for the identification and assessment of children with additional learning needs. Parents are encouraged to speak to their child's class teacher or the Additional Learning Needs Co-ordinator, Mr Manuel Pelaez-Heras if they are concerned about their child's learning or behaviour. If we have concerns over learning needs parents will be advised and involved in regular discussions about their child's progress and about ways in which they can help at home. In the majority of cases, needs will be met by the subject teachers who will provide differentiated teaching within the classroom. In other cases, children are withdrawn on a regular basis to work with staff on a specific Intervention Programme for an agreed length of time.

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## Admission to Ebbw Fawr Learning Community Derbyniad i Gymuned Ddysgu Ebwy Fawr

Application forms are distributed by the local authority to all Year 6 students as part of the local Admissions Policy. Our admissions number is 207. These places are allocated on the following basis:

Students within the catchment areas will be offered a place, subject to the admission number not being breached. In such instances, places will be allocated in accordance with the Authority's over subscription criteria as follows:

- Looked After Children will also be admitted to a chosen school outside of the normal admission round. The admission cannot be refused unless doing so would seriously prejudice the proposition of efficient education or the efficient use of resources.
- (ii) Students who reside within the school's designated catchment area.
- (iii) Children recommended for admission on medical grounds, supported by a Medical Officer or psychological or special educational needs reasons. These must be confirmed by the LEA's professional advisers.
- (iv) Children who have older siblings (brothers or sisters) living at the same household attending the school at the date of admission will be admitted in preference to those who do not;
- (v) Where there is more than one case as in (ii), priority to be assessed on the basis of those children closest in age to the elder siblings already at the school at the date of admission;
- (vi) After taking account of categories (i) to (iv), priority will be based on closeness to the school, measured by nearest available walking route. This will be measured on the Authority's GIS (Geographical Information System) database;

- (vii) Should admission to a school not be possible due to class size or other requirements, transport will be provided to the next nearest school with available places (subject to distance limits).
- (viii) When considering whether a child lives in a school's catchment area, the address considered is that of the parent or legal guardian, irrespective of a family's domestic arrangements, i.e. the address of another relative or child minder etc. must not be given. In certain cases it may be necessary to provide evidence relating to the child/ren in question, to show the home address of the child/ren.
- (ix) Subject to class size and other requirements, students resident outside the school's catchment area will be admitted if the admissions number of the school has not been exceeded. In the event of over- subscription from outside the catchment area of the school, the sub-criteria described at (i) to (iv) above will be applied to prioritise admissions.
